As a kid, Molino asked for two things for Christmas: a sewing machine and a typewriter. When her mother said she could only have one of the two, the sewing machine won out.

She naturally excelled in sewing classes in junior high.

"[My classmates are] making pillows and I'm making suits," she recalled.

"I've always loved fashion ever since I was a little girl. I always wanted to be a fashion designer. That was my dream," Molino said, sipping cappuccino at a Newtown coffee shop sporting a fitted, deep blue blouse with three-quarter length sleeves that complemented her blue eyes. It was tucked neatly into a knee-length black skirt. A multi-strand pearl necklace fell at her collarbone offset by a pair of pearl teardrop-shaped earrings.

Her major in junior college? Fashion merchandising. Her bachelor's degree? Fashion design. Her first job? Clothing retail.

She's written columns and articles on fashion. She's taught fashion design. And most recently, she's started her own business called the Fashion Fix which helps people develop their own fashion sense.

For a fee, Molino sets up an initial consultation to talk to the client in order to get a feel for his or her stylistic taste, body type and shopping habits. Then it's off to the closet.

That blouse with the missing buttons you swear you'll sew on one day — it goes. The pants with the price tag still on them because you don't have a shirt to wear with them, well what's holding you back?
